



What might we have in common with our brothers and sisters of other faith traditions? Julia shares that too often we are taught to fear other religions and to avoid them, and that although we may not see Jesus in the same way, all religious traditions contain some concept of compassion and desire to help people and society. She encourages us to take the time to listen to our neighbors' narratives and build friendships with people of different faith traditions – and that long term friendships and conversations with diverse neighbors will positively impact our social work practice and our personal lives, and lead to betterment of society.


