


Confidentiality: Why

- Definition of Confidential: Disclosed in secret; entrusted with another's confidence.
- Power and vulnerability
- Access to information
- Inadequate knowledge about the impact of information (what is at stake)
- Self awareness (being in the know)

Confidentiality: Why continued

- Professional Ethics;NASW and StateRegulations
- Licensure: Personal
- Accreditation: Agency
- Certification: Both
- Personal: "Treat others as I wish to be treated."
